Wake Tech CCP Pathways

Career and Technical Education (CTE) Pathway

Leads to a certificate or diploma aligned with a high school Career Cluster. It is designed for high school students who want to work toward the completion of a credential before graduating from high school. Please contact CCP staff with any questions on what is needed for these pathways and courses.

College Transfer (CT) Pathway

Designed for high school juniors and seniors who wish to begin earning college credit towards our <u>University Transfer</u> degree programs- Associate in Arts, Associate in Engineering, Associate in Science or Associate in Fine Arts. These are intended to be for eventual transfer to a four-year college or university. The pathway includes courses prescribed in the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement with UNC System member institutions.

Wake Tech CCP Career and Technical (CTE) Pathway

To be eligible to enroll as a Freshman or Sophomore:

- 1. Be a high school freshman or sophomore
- Have the recommendation and rationale of the high school principal or his/her designee
- 3. Grade of C or better in Math I, EOC score of 3, 4, or 5 for Math I, **and** EOG score of 3, 4, or 5 for 8th grade ELA Assessment; **or** demonstrate college readiness on an approved assessment in English, Reading, and Math

Wake Tech CCP Career and Technical (CTE) Pathway

To be eligible to enroll as a Junior or Senior:

- 1. Be a high school junior or senior
- 2. Have an unweighted GPA of 2.8 or better on high school courses; or demonstrate college readiness on an approved assessment in English, Reading, and Math or have the recommendation and rationale of the high school principal/designee if GPA does not meet requirement.

Wake Tech College Transfer (CT) Pathway

To be eligible to enroll as a Freshman or Sophomore:

- 1. Be a high school freshman or sophomore; **and**
- 2. Be identified as gifted by local AIG plan in English/Reading and Math; or aptitude and achievement test scores for English, Reading, and Math (92nd to 99th percentiles) in the Mental Measurements Yearbook published by the Buros Institute of Mental Measurements; and
- Demonstrate college readiness in English, Reading, and Math on an approved assessment; <u>and</u>
- Receive recommendation (verifying maturity to enroll) of high school principal (or equivalent administrator) via memo; <u>and</u>
- 5. Receive written consent of the student's parent/guardian via memo; and
- 6. Receive mandatory academic advising prior to course registration

Wake Tech College Transfer (CT) Pathway

To be eligible to enroll as a Junior or Senior:

- 1. Be a high school junior or senior, **and**
- 2. Have an unweighted GPA of 2.8 on high school courses; or
- Demonstrate college readiness in English, Reading, and Math on an approved assessment

Wake Tech CCP Continuation

For continuation in the program:

To **maintain eligibility** for continued enrollment, a student must:

- 1. Continue to progress toward high school graduation: and
- 2. Maintain a GPA of 2.0 in college coursework after completing two courses.

CCP Enrollment

First step: Student views online mandatory information session.

Next, students begin CCP Enrollment Online:



- · CCP Application (received via email) Once this is submitted, you will receive a link for EV form.
- · Eligibility Verification (EV) Form
 - > Signatures -Students will be required to put the **name and email** of their designated parent and appropriate staff member on the EV Form for e-Signature.

- · Attach high school transcript (PDF Format) and any applicable supplemental documents.

- SAT/ACT scores
- Extracurricular Activities (clubs, sports, job, etc)
- Community Service
- Personal Statement
- Recommendation Letter(s)



GPA (Grade Point Average)

Grade Point Average (GPA) summarizes your overall performance in your high school courses.

When it comes to GPA, start strong and stay strong!

Facts about GPA:

- It is <u>cumulative</u> and reflects <u>all</u> of the classes you take in high school.
- Honors & AP level classes help you to earn extra quality points, which can enhance your GPA.
- GPA can play an important role in opportunities offered to you in and after high school.
- Typically, the higher your GPA, the more choices you will have for
 college, scholarships, etc.



ACT/SAT Fee Waivers

 SAT and ACT fee waivers are available for economically disadvantaged students. (free/reduced lunch, trio, etc)

You may receive 2 SAT and 4
 ACT waivers a lifetime.

 If using SAT/ACT fee waiver, you also qualify for College Application fee waivers.

 See Student Services if you believe you are eligible for a fee waiver.

Preparing for the ACT/SAT

- **Know what to expect.** Be familiar with the format of the test that you choose to take by taking the PreACT and PSAT.
- Take practice tests for free. bigfuture.org, satpractice.org, cfnc.org,
 KhanAcademy.org, act.org, Kaplan.com.
- **Check your timing.** Be sure to time yourself while you are completing practice tests so you can experience real test-day conditions.
- Pace yourself don't spend too much time on a single passage or question.
- On difficult questions, eliminate as many incorrect answers as you can, then
 make an educated guess among those remaining. Answer every question.
 Remember, there is no penalty for guessing.

College Admissions Tests

Changes made to ACT starting September 2020

- Section Retesting: Students who have completed the full ACT will have the ability to retake one or more sections without retaking the entire ACT.
- **Superscoring**: Score reports will now include student's ACT superscore and composite score.
 - Takes the average of the four best subject areas from each ACT attempt

Tips for Sophomore/Junior Year

- Review your academic plan with your counselor
- Use **CFNC.org** to take interest assessments that will match your interests with college/career options.
- Attend college fairs and financial aid workshops
- Visit/Research colleges and check admissions requirements of colleges that interest you.
- Start researching scholarships, grants, and loans using CFNC.org
- Find a summer job or internship in your field of interest. (contact our CDC, Ms. Wright)
- Participate in enrichment opportunities (visit our KHSCD Student Services website)
- Prepare for College Admissions test. 10th Pre-ACT and/or PSAT 11th ACT/SAT
- Talk with coaches about college sports and scholarship eligibility
- Talk with military representatives if interested
- Take rigorous courses and keep your grades up

AP Courses

- College level courses offered in high school
- Courses reflect what is taught in introductory college courses
- Students take AP Exams in May, measuring their mastery of college-level work
- A score of 3 or higher on an AP Exam will earn students college credit in all UNC Systems Schools (For private and out of state will need to research)

AP Course Benefits

- Students learn rigorous college-level content and skills
- Taking AP is valued in the college admission process
- AP courses are interesting and rewarding academic experiences aligned with student interests
- Opportunity to earn valuable credit and placement in collegesaving time and money!
- Taking an AP course helps students build critical thinking skills, confidence, and the essential time management and study skills needed for college success

Governor's School


